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Concept VI

We have seen that the "final responsibility and ultimate authority" for A.A.'s service activities rest with the A.A. groups (Concept I), but to carry out this responsibility they must delegate to the Conference (Concept II). The Conference, in turn, must delegate administrative authority to the General Service Board of Trustees. Again, it is helpful if you are familiar with both the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board to understand this relationship and the freedom of action that the trustees must have.

The trustees have the legal and practical responsibility for the operation of A.A. World Services, Inc. (which embraces A.A. publishing as well as the General Service Office) and of the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. These entities have a combined cash flow of many millions of dollars annually. The trustees are also responsible for A.A.'s public information activities. They are the guardians of the Twelve Traditions. They are responsible for carrying the A.A. message to other countries around the world. They are A.A.'s "bankers," overseeing the financial operations and investing A.A.'s substantial Reserve Fund. (Read the text of Concept XI for a more detailed account of their functions.)

Bill makes the point that although "our objective is always a spiritual one," nevertheless our world service is a "large business operation." "Indeed," he says, "our whole service structure resembles that of a large corporation. The A.A. groups are the stockholders, the delegates represent them, like proxy-holders, at the annual meeting; the General Service Board Trustees are actually the directors of a 'holding company.' And this holding company (the General Service Board) actually owns and controls the two 'subsidiaries' (A.A.W.S. and the A.A. Grapevine) which carry on the . . . services.

"This very real analogy makes it . . . clear that, like any other board of directors, our trustees must be given large powers if they are to manage the . . . affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous."



AA HISTORY CORNER

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75 Years Ago This Month—

"Five members of [Washington's] old Central Group meet ...to discuss the need for an A.A. Group in the upper Northwest-Silver Spring area... [I]t was decided...a new group was not needed. Not only were there just a few members then living in the area, but it seemed to them ...such a fine, respectable neighborhood would not likely produce many new prospects. "[Emphasis added, cf. AA ANNUAL BANQUET, Silver Spring, Maryland Group, Twenty-Sixth Anniversary 1971]

According to official chronicles, the A.A. Grape-vine: A.A. 's Meeting in Print is inaugurated—and since then, Washington area A.A.'s are recorded as participants.

Bill G. of Washington, DC writes in the October 1953 issue:

I was the first or one of the first subscribers to *The Grapevine* in the Washington area. Every time *The Grapevine* hits my house I have a grand A.A. meeting with people all over the world. This is the first time I have sent a contribution and the rest of this letter is a "gripe!"


Probably this is the Bill G., renown for fostering new-comers, for whom the Metropolis Club's dubbed his name to one of its meeting rooms. [Cf. *New Reporter*, October 2017, p7]

The *Grapevine*'s April 1945 issue reports:

Lunching in the Senate dining room the other noon with Dr. E. M. Jellinek, director of the Section on Alcohol Studies of the Laboratory of Applied Physiology at Yale, were a significant collection of people. Discussing with Dr. Jellinek the establishment of clinics for alcoholics in Washington, DC, were ...a representative of the Senate District

[of Columbia] Committee...[the] chair of the House District Committee; and a representative of the House Appropriations Committee for the District. . . .

A step toward cooperation with AA is being taken at Washington's



District Jail, Howard B. Gill, superintendent, announced a few days ago, with a committee from the Washington AA group visiting the jail regularly. Statistics show a majority of the 12,000 alcoholics passing through ... each year are old offenders. [The] Most frequent visitor is a man now on his 157th sentence.

And the *Grapevine*'s October 1945 issue reports, in addition to the Silver Spring Group's founding (June 1945—what?--one year earlier!!?), the founding of a District of Columbia public clinic for alcoholics—a facility which grew out of proposals from A.A. and which

"marks a long step forward in the scientific treatment of alcoholics....Precautions have been taken to keep the clinic entirely separate from jails, courts and punishment institutions, although judges are expected to parole alcoholics into the care of the clinic for treatment rather than punishment. Dr. Miller [a St. Elizabeth psychiatrist volunteering services to the clinic] has said there will be a three-point program, consisting of physical care first, then mental, and finally the patients will be turned over to A.A."



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75 Years Ago This Month—continued

Then the June 1946 Grapevine announces some results published in the *Washington DC News*:

"Alcoholics Anonymous, working with District [of Columbia] authorities, made 54 'saves' out of 66 attempts here in the first three months of this year, Municipal Probation Officer Robert J. Connor has reported. He credited the Municipal Court plan of treating alcoholism as an illness rather than as a crime with salvaging many shattered lives."

The *Grapevine*'s June 1952 issue carries an anonymously penned article entitled "A.A. on the Potomac" which sketches the Washington Group's early development and which places the origin of the socalled "squads" in the year 1944. [Cf. New Reporter, October 2017, p7] As the year 1945 closes, the Grapevine runs a series outlining the various plans and methods followed by different groups throughout the country. The December issue on St. Paul, Minnesota's methods cites the "Washington pamphlet." [Note: WAIA's Archives has a copy of each 1) this pamphlet "Alcoholics Anonymous: An Interpretation of Our Twelve Steps" with attendant background sources and 2) a Julius S. interview describing the pamphlet's publisher—"Uncle Dick" with whom Julius has a scheduled meeting at the Euclid clubhouse circa 1945.] These methods around the country seem to be efforts to reduce relapses.

Washington A.A.'s Twelfth-Step tradition again gets reported in the March 1946 *Grapevine* issue where it quotes *The Washington Times-Herald*:

"Eight new patients and six who were formerly treated at the Force School presented themselves as willing subjects for an alcoholic cure when the Polk climaxed by an annual dinner. Health Center Alcoholic Clinic for ...[African-Americans] went into operation January 15.

"Co-operating with the new clinic is the Wash-

ington ...[African-American] Group of Alcoholics Anonymous, which meets Fridays and Sundays at 8:30 p.m. in the YMCA at 1816 Twelfth St. NW. The group supplies volunteer clerical help for the clinic, and alcoholics who require group therapy are referred to the organization by the doctors." [Note: The Force School at 1740 Massachusetts NW serves as the meeting location of the Washington Squad One beginning in the third quarter of 1946. Formerly, the squad meets at the Washington Group Club house at 1368 Euclid Street, NW. The DC News dated May 11, 1946 reports: "Alcoholics Anonymous...revealed yesterday that the organization is to be evicted from its quarters {an apartment building}...as 'undesirable tenants."

The *Grapevine*'s March 1947 issue reports about the appearance of a woman member of the Washington Group on the Ruth Crane "Modern Woman" broadcast on WMAL. The program guest is familiar with the objectives of A.A. and of the District of Columbia's alcoholic clinics. She is trained by the Yale Summer School on alcoholism. Likely, she is Lib S. who would go on to give prodigies of service to our area, to the General Service Office in New York, as well as to Baltimore.

The *Grapevine*'s October 1947 issue recounts a Memorial Day celebration by the A.A. groups in Washington in memory of their deceased members—particularly Lt. Col. H. C. and J. H. M. (noted founder of the Washington Group known as Fitz M.) Members journey to these two grave sites laying a wreath at H. C.'s. The *Grapevine*'s January 1948 issue announces the formation of the Central-Atlantic Region "group"—comprised of all Maryland, Virginia, and the District of Columbia individual groups—to share in a day-long forum climaxed by an annual dinner.



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75 Years Ago This Month—continued

The Grapevine's October 1972 issue recounts some of thirty-seven-year-old Fred F.'s story beginning in the Fall of 1954—then a spent news-media, public-relations hound. Introduced in the hospital to A.A. by Ed D., Fred sprinkles Grapevine issues with a wide range of experiences over the years from May 1969 to January 1983. Notably, Fred invites other Areas to inaugurate the Washington initiated Mini-Conference in the May 1974 issue. As it turns out, in the Grapevine's August 2018 issue, the Washington Area's General Service Assembly Chair, Lynette D. relates her experience as chair of the Mini-Conference Committee, under the nurturing wing of our beloved past-Delegate Carmella.

In the *Grapevine*'s June 1972 issue, Fred reports on "the Airmen's Group":

"In the Washington, DC area, there is an 'A.A. squadron' of about 20 former Army, Navy, Marine and Air Corps flyers who hold a special A.A. meeting once a year, on December 7."

This calls to memory, Sandy B.'s film "Carrier Operations in a Blackout" shown at his anniversary on December 7 each year in Rosslyn—drunken scrambling pilots in a keystone-coptype escapade.

The *Grapevine*'s October 2009 issue publishes the Area 13 Delegate Elaine G.'s talk at the Northeast Regional Forum entitled "Inclusive Never Exclusive"—a phrase em-

ployed by Bill W. in his August 1946 *Grape-vine* essay on the Third Tradition. Elaine explains with the experience of our Area:

"...a number of black alcoholics had found sobriety through Alcoholics Anonymous. Out of this came the first black Alcoholics Anonymous group; this can be found in 'Jim's Story' in the *Big Book*. The group is still in existence today and is known as the Cosmopolitan Group in Washington, DC."

Currently, Irving M., an active member at the Area 13 Assembly and the Northern Virginia Intergroup, is a notable contributor. He reports in the *Grapevine's* February 2018 issue on a meeting-lead in which he is interrogated by group members. This sounds like a moral steel-wool scrubbing revealing painful memories but nevertheless uncovering peace. In the *Grapevine's* December 2018 issue, Irving calls for a "Big Hug" for you're A.A. Intergroups!!!!!!!!! Go Irving!!



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50 Years Ago This Summer— *The A.A. Service Manual* emerges from A.A.'s press and is billed as the brand new, complete revision of the "Third Legacy Manual." It still would contain Bill's original, beautiful history and inspired explanation of the conference structure as first published in 1955. However, many vital General Service representatives, committees, delegates and area activities are newly introduced.

The first open A.A. meeting in Hungary is held on June 12, 1969.

25 Years Ago This Month— The *Grapevine*'s 50th anniversary is celebrated June 25th at the Glenmont Methodist Church, 12901 Georgia Avenue, Wheaton, MD with free workshops including a Grape-a-thon from noon to 6 pm, an open A.A. meeting from 8 to 9 pm, and a dance (with a suggested donation of \$5.00) from 9 pm to midnight.





A.A. members urgently needed for Corrections Correspondence Service – especially men!

The General Service Office has an urgent need for A.A. men to write to inmates through the Corrections Correspondence Service (CCS).

Currently there are 200 male inmates waiting for an outside A.A. member to write to them. (Female A.A. members in prison can get linked right away, thanks to all the female volunteers who have signed up.) We need your help to alleviate this problem.

CCS is not a traditional pen pal service or automatic sponsorship service. This service offers the opportunity for A.A. members on the inside and the outside to share experience, strength and hope with each other via postal correspondence. G.S.O. only makes the initial connection, which is a random match between inmates with a drinking problem and outside members of the same gender who live in another region or province away from the correctional facility. The CCS program does not assign sponsors, but a sponsorship relationship may develop after the initial contact is made.
