Bored in A.A.?

I once heard an A.A. who was a master at one-liner definitions, "Boredom is a lack of involvement." Get yourself involved.

1. Make all the 12th Step calls you can. Let not only the central office, but everyone you can think of know that you need the calls.
2. Talk to newcomers at meetings and get their phone numbers. Then call them every day for 30 days without waiting for them to call you.
3. Instead of allowing A.A. to merely fill the vacancies in your life, arrange your life to revolve around A.A. and all sorts of A.A. activities.
4. Go to meetings to give rather than merely to get. When you attend only for what you get, you soon become bored.
5. Make A.A. a success in the area where you live. There always more things to be done to make A.A. more successful. Find them and do them.
6. Be a successful member of A.A.; make this a primary goal in your life.
7. Attend meetings for the purpose of helping each participant give his or her pitch, rather than merely of hearing. If you go only to be there, you will be bored with speakers you have heard before.
8. Get involved in living room A.A." social activities. Invite friends in for a party. In the middle of the party, have a meeting.
9. Have people you sponsor call you every day. Offer help with their problems, yet let them know you need help.
10. Keep a list of numbers near your telephone. Whenever you have five minutes, call someone in A.A. You don't need a reason.

11. Attend as large a variety of A.A. functions as you can – conventions, roundups, workshops, anything having to do with service, everything having to do with A.A.

12. Try out every meeting in your area and get to as large a variety of meeting types as possible. Fill your car with A.A. friends and try out new meetings in other towns. Meet new people and get new ideas.



13. Find a new kind of A.A. activity that you haven't tried before, e.g., volunteer for one of the committees for the next A.A. convention.

14. Apply Rule 62 at all times. (See under Tradition Four in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions.

15. Remember that happiness is the absence of unhappiness. Tell yourself that if you are not enjoying A.A., you aren't doing it right.

16. Keep your eyes on the A.A. recoveries and off the failures. The former are stimulating; the latter are fatiguing.

17. Have a Home group and get yourself elected secretary.

18. Start new meetings. Decide what kind of meeting would excite you, write up the format, find a hall, get started. If it's a good idea, it will prosper, if not, it will simply fold or change. Either way, it's no problem.

19. Be proud you are sober. Have panache! Every sober member of A.A. has a right, perhaps even an obligation, to walk with his or her head held high. We are doing something that no one else—not the medical profession, the legal profession, and the various religions and churches—has been able to do. [This is not to imply that A.A. is the only solution.] Each of us is keeping a severe alcoholic both sober and comfortable, one day after another. That's an accomplishment to be proud of.

Give Time Time

This old time saying isn't heard much anymore. The meaning is clear to some but to the newcomer it sounds pretty stupid. Give time time comes from people who have been sober a while and are able to look back on the hysteria of being newly sober.



When I first got sober, I felt like I had to fix everything right that minute! I wanted all my relationships, which I had demolished from years of drinking, to be right as rain instantly. I wanted my employer to have trust and faith in me right away, even though I had called off work because of hangovers more than I showed up at work. I wanted my family to embrace my efforts and trust me, even though I had spent many years dragging them through the gutters of alcoholism. I wanted my old drinking buddies to know that I had found a better way of life and they should too.

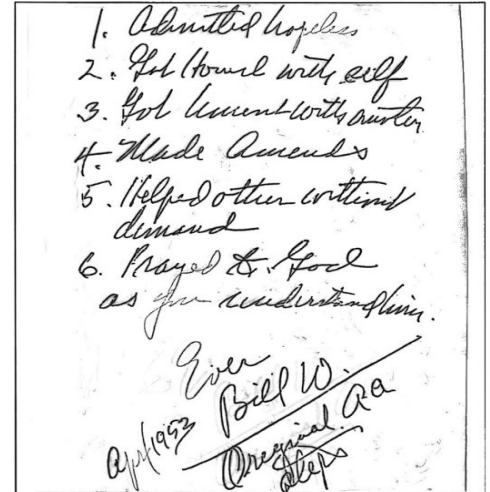
Needless to say, rushing around trying to fix everything is a waste of energy. Give time time means be still and let God work out those relationships that you think need fixed right now. Give time time means to let go and let God. "Time heals all wounds" may be a cliché but that is exactly what give time time means. Give your family enough time to heal the hurts that alcoholism inflicts. Give your employer time to begin to trust that you'll show up without a hangover every day. Give your friends a good example to follow into A.A. instead of preaching to them about A.A.

If you are new in A.A., try to give time time and you will be amazed at the harmonious outcome for everyone involved.

85 Years-Ago This Month—There's hustle and bustle in February? You bet? Indeed, from New York to California, AA's are expectant of great results from Jack Alexander's article printed in the *Saturday Evening Post*. The March issue hits the newsstands, in some locales, on February the 24th, 1941 with the AA piece.

Lois records in her February 4th diary entry, "We all returned early to club for meeting about handling volunteers and new prospects after *Post* article comes out. I'm to be liaison between office and club and handle volunteers." And in her February 25th, "Typed 'Plan of Action' after *Post* article."



"Out in Toledo, Ohio, a new member named Garth M. was given a two-dollar roll of nickels by the group and was sent on a tour of magazine outlets until he had bought 40 copies." [*Pass It On*, p247]

"'Alcoholics Anonymous' (with the subhead 'Freed Slaves of Drink, Now They Free Others') was the lead story in the issue....the article was illustrated with four photographs of members (unidentified, of course) in typical alcoholic and AA-related circumstances. One photo taken before the fireplace at the 24th Street Clubhouse (the slogan 'But for the Grace of God' hung prominently over the mantel) showed Bill sitting front row, center, surrounded by Horace C., Helen P., Tom M., Tom B., Ruth Hock, Dick S., Ray S., Lois, Gordon M., and Bob F. Many of them had their backs to the camera. The photograph was captioned 'A typical clubhouse discussion group.'" [*Pass It On*, p247]

Meanwhile Bob V. has the mission of presenting the Alcoholic Foundation's budget proposal to the groups. In a February 26, 1941 letter to Ruth Hock, Bob writes:

...Miss Washington was a pushover. The only objections raised here were to the effect that the budget did not take care of Bill, the elders here—Big Lumber man from Alexander [sic] [Bill A.] and the "Energy Boy" [Dan S.] are all for starting something for Bill...

Bill and Lois of course continue to live at the Clubhouse until April 1941 when they move into *Stepping Stones*. [GSO Box 37 R 18 File DC – A p 69]

13th ANNIVERSARY MEETING OF MEN'S HOME

With dance to follow and buffet will be held Feb. 4, 1966 from 8-12 PM at the Mt. Olivet Church, 16th and Glebe Rd., Arlington, Va. Tom L. will be master of Ceremonies with Virgil W. of Decatur, Ga. as Speaker. Buffet will be prepared by Harold of Home followed by door prizes after meeting. Tickets available from Group Secretaries.

And the February 1966 WAIA Reporter announces: FIRE AT MEN'S HOME. . .On February 4th the Men's Home at 1050 N. Irving, Arlington, Va. was severely damaged by fire and the building vacated. Occupants are temporarily being housed by several AA members. Whether the building will be repaired is not known at this time. The new *Where & When* will not show address—groups will be notified as soon as new address is known.

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NEW *WHERE & WHEN* BOOKLETS—These should be available by the end of the month. Copies will cost the same as before. \$4.00 per hundred—5¢ each in smaller quantities. PLEASE...we cannot mail them or charge them. Harold T. will be in charge of distribution at 1760 [1760 Columbia Road, NW]. Pick them up from him. If paying by check make it out simply to WAIA. [The January 1966 WAIA Reporter lists around forty-five groups contributing to WAIA in 1965 among nearly fifty total listed groups. The January 2015 WAIA New Reporter lists around two-hundred-sixty groups contributing to WAIA in 2014 among around three-hundred-five total listed groups.]

35 Years-Ago This Month— At the monthly Board Meeting, WAIA's Office Manager Lee D. requests "increasing the price of the *Where & When* which now costs 30¢ to print and at present is selling for 25¢". The Board approves raising the price to 30¢ after rejecting a proposal for a 35¢ price for this booklet considered a 12th-Step tool for the Newcomer.

Lee also reports, "Approximately 300 groups out of over 400 groups in the Washington area contributed to Intergroup last year."

Also the WAIA Archives Chair, Chad L. reports (1) that two Washington area members had articles printed in the January *Grapevine* and (2) that "Bob E., who was one of the founders of WAIA, and who just celebrated 50 years of sobriety, has lung cancer." Bob E. would depart two days later on February 14, 1991 for the Big Meeting in the Sky.

GSA Liaison Scotty reports "The Mini-Conference will be on March 23, 1991...the cost will be \$10.00." [Presently the Mini-Conference has no registration fee, although the Assembly now regularly passes the Seventh-Tradition hat.]

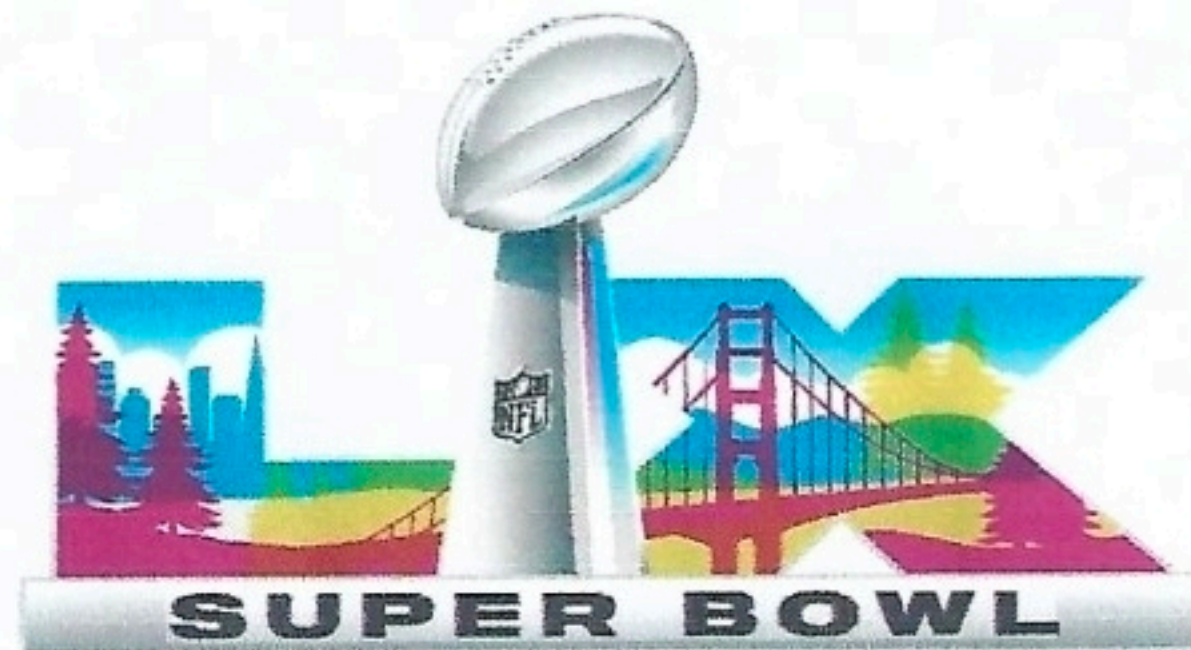
